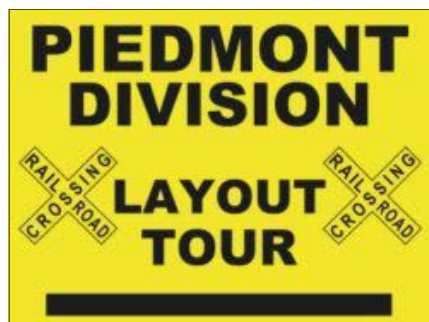

# Model Citizen Try Something New

Model Railroading is a great hobby that includes variety in every form. Building a layout requires skills and knowledge of carpentry, electrical work, painting, trackwork, modeling and prototype railroads. With so many options, I am not sure how anyone could get bored. So, with every new project I take on, I try do something different using a new technique or material. I like to take every possible opportunity to learn something new.

Structure modeling is a great area to experiment with new materials and techniques. I have used styrene, wood, metal, plaster and paper in structure models. Usually, the best material is the one closest to the real life material. Model strip wood represents wooden building the best. Plaster is great when modeling rocks or stone. Scale corrugated aluminum makes a great metal roofing. But styrene is like a chameleon, a master of disguise. Styrene is available with all kinds of patterns like brick, stone, tile, clapboard and other siding. Styrene can be painted and weathered to look like wood, stone, or metal. Painting styrene to realistically portray another material can be challenging. But in many cases, styrene can be the easiest material for construction.

I prefer to use any and all of these materials. In my Terminal Railroad Cafe, I scratchbuilt the building using brick patterned styrene, corrugated aluminum siding, strip styrene for windows and doors, along with wood for the attached shed. The roof was covered with strips of black paper and tissue paper painted black for flashing. I created paper signs (of course) to match the prototype photos. The point of using all of these materials was to match the prototype. But I must say that mixing and matching materials makes a great look.

Recently, I have been trying paper for modeling. I got a cheap

plastic kit at a train show. The brick / stone pattern pressed into the kit walls did not impress me. But I liked the lines and shape of the kit. So, I covered it with Paper Creek Model Works brick paper. I cut the paper to fit and glued it on using a glue stick. Unless you are closer than 8 inches, you would not be able to tell that it is flat paper. You can try a sample outhouse model for free at their website <http://www.papercreek.com/>. Bob McIntyre recently used paper brick that he printed out on his Pennsy tower. And Joe Nichols, Sr. has been using brick paper on his new industrial area. I suggest you try this technique for an upcoming project.

Painting and weathering is another area of modeling where you have almost endless techniques and materials available. Recently, I have been experimenting with weathering powders and pastel chalks. Usually, I start painting with a base of spray primer (grey or red depending on the situation). I often brush paint most of my models and come out with a nice finish. Until about a year ago, I had only weathered my models with acrylic paint washes and an alcohol ink solution. I picked up a set of Bar Mills weathering powders at the hobby shop. I should warn that a little of these can go a long way. I learned this during my first project using them. Weathering powders are pure pigment with a binding agent like glue. As you rub them on, the color gets deeper. Once I learned to use a light hand, I got excellent results with these powders. I also went to the local art store (Dick Blick) to purchase artists pastels in both earth tones and assorted colors. These pastels are a bit more subtle. First, I scrape the pastel color to create a powder. Then using one of my wife's eye makeup brushes (new, not one she is using!), I can apply colors that give my models an extra level of depth and texture. I am sure this new technique will take me a while to perfect. And I am having fun trying.

I challenge everyone to try something new on your next modeling project. Try something outside of your "comfort zone". Try scratchbuilding or kitbashing. Try a new painting or weathering technique like pastels or powders. I hope to bring something to the next division contest. I hope that you will have something there too.

# Piedmont Division to Host 2013 NMRA National Convention

*Peachtree Express*, we all need to get used to the sound. Our Division, the Piedmont Division was successful in winning the bid to host the 2013 National Model Railroad Convention. It started as an idea from now Superintendent Howard Goodwin after our very successful Regional Convention in Cartersville. At least one National Board member was in attendance at that event and was very impressed. We put the Piedmont Division name in the hat and things started rolling.

In January of this year the National Model Railroad Association held their Board Meeting in Atlanta to scope out the city and look for potential venues for 2013. A large group of the Piedmont Division members attended the meeting braving inclement weather to learn more about hosting a National Convention. We met the key people involved with the Convention, including Henry Jordan who is the National Chair. All of us felt we could make a good presentation at the National Convention this year in Anaheim, California and also host the event in 2013. We all came away feeling good about our chances.

Ron Gough agreed to put together the PowerPoint and make the presentation. After receiving input from the Division members in the late spring the presentation was ready to go. It detailed the highlights of Atlanta as a railroad town. There are tremendous locations for rail and non-rail tours. Our annual Piedmont Pilgrimage already has the layouts we need for the layout tour program. The Cobb County Galleria and the attached Waverly Hotel would be the site of the National Train Show and the Convention. This was covered in detail. Overall Atlanta was ready to go!

The Piedmont Anaheim Team consisted of Ron Gough,

MMR, Bob McIntyre, 2013 Convention Chair, Howard Goodwin, Superintendent, Del Kittendorf, Rob Dodds, and Perry Lamb. The PowerPoint went exceptionally well. There were very few initial questions from the National Board. We were the first to present and our competition, Pittsburgh went second. I have to admit that we looked great with our Peachtree Express golf shirts and that professionalism did not hurt.

The Board then deliberated over whom to present the Convention. They asked a few questions to our team such as would we consider modification to the event (days, tours, etc.). We said we would work with the National Convention Team and Board on all conditions. Shortly after the Piedmont Division was the winner!

We have 5 years to go but work will have to be started as soon as possible. Currently, both David Gelmini and Perry Lamb have agreed to be the Convention Assistant Chairs. We also have a large number of Division members agreeing to head up specific functions. These include tour coordinators, clinics, advertising, layouts, and others. Step by step we will get everything done. Early this fall we will have our first full staff meeting.

Please note that we are going to need your help to pull this event off. As we go forward more and more volunteers will be needed so get ready to help. Stay tuned for more details.

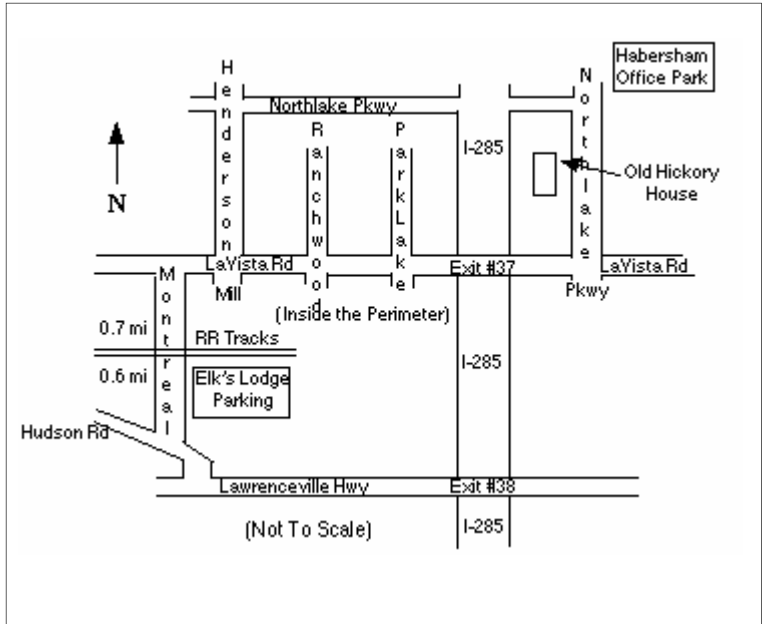
